Whereas: Monday, 10 October marked Indigenous Peoples' Day 2022, and

Whereas: The City of Tallahassee, Leon County, and the broader community of North Florida and Southern Georgia are situated on the traditional and ancestral land of the Apalachee Nation, the Muscogee Creek Nation, the Miccosukee Tribe of Florida, and the Seminole Tribe of Florida – land that remains scarred by the legacy of settler colonial violence, removal, and cultural erasure, and

Whereas: The State of Florida does not officially recognize nor celebrate Indigenous Peoples' Day, and

Whereas: The City of Gainesville, in 2018, became the very first city in Florida to officially commemorate Indigenous Peoples' Day, and

Whereas: President Joseph R. Biden, Jr., in 2021, became the first President of the United States to formally proclaim Indigenous Peoples' Day, and

Whereas: On 20 January 1851, the year of this institution's founding, the legislature of the State of Florida passed a bill calling on support from the federal government for the "speedy and final removal of the remnant of Seminole Indians now remaining in Florida," and

Whereas: The Florida State University prides itself on its longstanding relationship, "built on respect," with the Seminole Tribe of Florida, and

Whereas: As of 2022, the Florida State University has officially adopted an institution-wide Native Land Acknowledgement, and

Whereas: The 74th Student Senate at Florida State University amended the 2022 Office of Governmental Affairs Legislative Agenda to include advocating for the development and completion of an interdisciplinary Center for Native American Studies on our campus,

Be it resolved by the Seventy-fourth Student Senate at Florida State University that: This body recognizes and honors Indigenous Peoples' Day today and every day, and

Be it further resolved that: This body reaffirms its commitment to advocate for the development and completion of an established on-campus interdisciplinary Center for Native American Studies, and

Be it further resolved that: This body encourages Florida State University to develop a meaningful and consistent way of commemorating Indigenous Peoples' Day in the future, and

Be it further resolved that: As the largest university in the United States to use Native American imagery in its symbolism and sports traditions, this body encourages Florida State University to further commit to justice, inclusivity, and reconciliation by all means at its disposal, including but not limited to more wide-spread adoption of the institutional land acknowledgment, by increased recruitment and retention of Indigenous faculty and students, by the expansion of Indigenous identity-based scholarships, and a clear commitment to the above clauses, and
