- Bill 29 Sponsored by Senator Goldstein (P)
 - Opening Statement:
 - Goldstein: Hi guys, I just presented this to Student Life and it passed unanimously, it's mainly just a clerical change, during Budget Week we zero-funded SAP, so this is just taking SAP out of statutes so we don't have to go through the debate again this upcoming year. All the funds that are normally allocated to SAP have been reallocated to PAC, RTAC, and the org fund. I yield.

- Bill 30 Sponsored by Senator Goldstein (P)
 - Opening Statement:
 - Goldstein: Hi guys, according to Budget proviso, we requested that the Senate do this, and make all of these accounts not being swept in their own area, also make WVFS not swept for the first time ever, so they don't have to be punished for not spending their like, 20 dollars that they have remaining and they can save their money. Beyond that, this is just doing what we wanted to do during Budget Week. I yield.

- Bill 33 Sponsored by Senators Brown, Larancuent (P)
 - Opening Statement:
 - Larancuent: Alright, so this bill allocates \$2,000.00 so the FSU Libraries can buy books for their Course Reserves collection. If you don't already know how Course Reserves works, a professor basically writes the books that they need for their class, and the students give the books they aren't going to use anymore at the end of the semester to the libraries, and students can check out the books for two hours. The books that they have mainly are stuff like religion, history, baby bio, and those types. We're no longer funding the test prep section because the Executive Branch is already funding them with \$5,000.00 solely for test prep books, we didn't

want to double dip. I'll possibly amend it to go lower on the floor, if they don't need that much money, but right now it's solely \$2,000 for books that they generally don't have that much access too, and FSU libraries have stated that they want to be able to purchase these books on their own, seeing as they are the ones that receive which books are missing. After they purchase these books, we can probably receive an itemized list of each book they've purchased, and I could show it to Senate in Public Comment. I think this would be really good for accessibility and affordability, I think this also follows some of our SGA Projects by helping students get the books for their classes that they're maybe not able to get because it's such a specific book. With that, I think this would really support academics and make it accessible to people, knowing that textbooks are very expensive. I yield.

 - Goldstein: I think this is absolutely amazing, I commend the sponsor on being able to advocate for an institution like the FSU Library program seeing as they don't have an active liaison at the time, I think you're going really above and beyond as a senator to make this progress happen. I commend them in all ways possible.

- Bill 34 Sponsored by Senator Larancuent (P)
 - Opening Statement:
 - Larancuent: So I amended this down to \$6,570.00, but I have another senator in this committee who will also be making another amendment to bring it even lower down. They will get to you after I tell you what the Bill is about. So, FSU Libraries currently does not have enough calculators, they only have 29 circulating between both, it would be amended down to 20 of each calculator which would consist of graphing, financial, scientific, and four function, which would amount to \$4,380.00. I think this would be really good, especially for those who cannot afford these calculators last minute, or they lost them and don't have the ability to purchase another one, or they saw it on the syllabus and said they'll just use the online one, until they have an exam and need it, or they're told to use one in class and it switches last minute for the exam. I just think this would be a lot easier, and the libraries said they'd also be interested in partnering with us to increase the rental period of them from 4 hours to more, seeing as now they will have more calculators. I think this would also be a good opening to see, if these calculators are being used even more, we can possibly give them more later on in Senate. Please ask me any questions, because I will most likely have the answer to any you have. I vield.

 - Rodriguez: I also want to commend the sponsor, this bill is really good, especially with the amount of calculators available right now to the student body, I think this addition will greatly help those students who cannot afford or gain access to a calculator on their own.

 - Opening Statement:
 - Khosh: Hi everyone, for clarification, my interesting location is Pike, I'm going to the Line Dance event, I want to meet Tyler Cameron, don't judge me. Anyways, this transfer is \$3,200.00 from Senate Projects to fund CDU's event, it's their annual Spring Fling event, and their first annual one was last year. I think. It had an attendance of over 1.300 people, and they did the event in collaboration with the Executive Branch last year, but this time around they want to do the event with Senate and the Executive Branch, to make it a bigger and better event this time around. I have been working with the Executive Branch, Director of Programming Yesenia on this, so this is the number we've got it to, this is to fund one of the food trucks for the event. I've also asked CDU to put the Senate logo on their Instagram when they post the flyer for the event. The event is in about 2 weeks, in April, and I think this would be a good way to continue our relationship with CDU. The last event that they had was their fashion show, which was a major success, and that came from some funding from us, so I would like us to continue to do that, because I think that brings a lot of visibility to Senate and the power that we have to make Student Life and everything around campus a better experience for people.
