- Candidate for Confirmation: Kailen Christian: Freshman Leadership Institute, Director
 - o Opening Statement:
 - Candidate Christian: All right. Hi, my name is Kailen Christian. I am a sophomore studying chemical engineering, and I am a candidate for the director of the Freshman Leadership Institute. This past fall, I had the pleasure of serving as a facilitator of operations, which was a really cool opportunity and helped me get a lot more acquainted with student government and the role that it plays. But I thought it was a little bit sad how there's a lot of kids that had a lot of passion just in general. And I feel like there's one aspect of it where it just kind of fed into the same few organizations. So my goal with FLI this year is to ensure that the students feel like they can take their leadership skills across any organization on campus, regardless of how prestigious it seems, because they can still make change through that ways. The last Leadership Awards night, I think we saw that a lot of the organizations that made the most change are those smaller orgs. And I think that being able to promote finding smaller communities on campus will help retention and help ensure that students are maximizing their student life, and we're ensuring that everyone feels like they found a place on campus. I also wanted to change a little bit of the leadership structure in terms of how the positions are broken up. And I also would like to restructure the committee clusters throughout to ensure that the students are getting more practical skills. especially with event planning. Because that was my position last year made me take a lot of data on what they did and didn't like and to I really use that to think of how it could be better for next year. So I'm really excited and I have a lot of plans and I think it would be a great year. So thank you.

- Senator Randall: Do you have any plans to sort of mitigate that or structure that mentorship program a little bit, like have a little bit more accountability with it? Because I know it's something that a lot of people struggled with.
 - Candidate Christian: So one thing that I want to do, and that's kind of what I was getting at with, I do feel like certain... um parts of campus were over represented within our mentors because i know for a fact there's a couple of students that i think would have appreciated more like small scale leadership mentors. And so that's something that i want to do is make sure that like all the rsos know about sga and know about like the role that it plays and also connecting those student leaders um to things throughout like the dsos as well um and other opportunities such as being like engaged 100 leaders um and stuff like that. So let me double check if i answered your question. Yes, so I wanted to, by expanding the scope of program and taking that more into account while picking out the students and picking out the mentors, I hope to facilitate better connections as well.
- Senator Randall: Yeah, just follow up on something that you said. How do you like specifically, because I know it can just like be hard to promote this kind of thing, like how do you kind of plan to promote it to RSOs,

especially given that like applications tend to open pretty early into the year. So like, how do you plan to kind of increase the visibility of FLI mentorship specifically?

- Candidate Christian: So that's something that I want to be really intentional about when picking the board, because I think the board that you choose has a really big impact on who ends up becoming mentors. And so like, I hope that whoever, like, I hope that I get a really diverse pool of applicants for facilitators, because I think that will be the biggest factor in helping me maximize my reach to all corners of campus. Also, I want to push back the selection of mentors a little bit until we have selected all of the students so that way we can try and match our mentors based on what the students need, if that makes sense.
- Senator Randall: Sorry, last question, I promise. I know FLI got \$5,000 in their budget for this upcoming fiscal year. How do you kind of plan to use that? Um, so can you repeat the number? I actually didn't know how much it was five thousand dollars
 - Candidate Christian: okay so i haven't broken it down yet. Um, but one thing i really want to do, and this is where i think most of our spending is going to be concentrated, is the biggest like feedback we got last year that people didn't have enough event planning skills. So I really want to do an fli week of events where Each committee cluster is going to be in charge of hosting some sort of event, whether it's an internal event with the rest of their FOI cohort, whether that's some sort of service event with a collaboration. I really think it would be super cool if FCC is picked by this point to do some sort of collab event with FCC and then maybe like a market Wednesday tabling. So I think that like paying for those events would be a substantial portion of it. I would love to do t-shirts again and then planning the banquet would, planning the banquet would probably be, um, about half of it. And then the last thing i wanted to do was, um, we had an, like, I know we actually did really good last year with retention, but in the past they've had issues with retention. And so i kind of wanted to make more tangible, um, rewards for people that do the program fully and come to each workshop as they're supposed to. and so we were thinking about ordering like enamel pins like sort of how people get when they get into like ggk or renegade or 1910 so that way like the people that successfully complete the program like everyone can come to the banquet but the people that have like perfect attendance or only had excused absences um will get like a little pin to certify their completion through the program

 - Senator Randall: Yeah, so I've known this candidate for quite a long time, for the past two years, and she has always been someone that is so driven and so dedicated to what they get involved in, and whenever she speaks, I just feel like there's so much passion behind everything that she says, and I mean, everything that she said in this interview was great. I'm really excited for her to hopefully be in this position. I think that she very

 - Opening Statement:
 - Candidate Donaldson Pham: So thank you so much. Hi, my name is Annalise Donaldson-Fong, and I am honored to be in front of you today to represent FSU's Medical Response Unit as their candidate for executive director. I've been carefully chosen by my peers as the best fit to represent the unit, and I'm respectfully requesting your approval to be the executive director for the Medical Response Unit at FSU for the fall 2024 to spring 2025 school year. I believe that I am the best fit for this position as I come armed with proven experience in and dedication to the MRU, from which I have earned the backing of my fellow responders. I am here today simply because I am passionate about this organization and its values. I'm a little different from my peers as I am not pre-med, I'm not pre-nursing, nor do I plan to pursue any medical graduate degrees. I joined the MRU because I believe in its values and the skill sets it provides to all volunteers. and I wholeheartedly believe in its services that it provides to our campus. Highlighting and promoting the importance of pre-hospital care to everyone, pre-med or not, is one of my goals for the continued success of the MRU. Furthermore, this year I served as one of the four heads of our 5K committee for our 15th annual 5K fundraiser and was a key player in the most successful 5K in MRU history. This experience coupled with my role as a crew leader in my weekly shifts equipped me to be ready to take on the challenge of being executive director of the MRU and solidified both my peers and my own confidence in my leadership abilities. Outside of FSU and the MRU, I can be found working in Gadsden County as an emergency medical technician on the ambulances, a job I take very seriously and in which I take a lot of pride. With your blessing, I would like to continue serving not only the organization that has given me so many opportunities to grow as a person and as a student, but also FSU as a whole, as we together continue the successful operations of an organization that sets us apart

as a university. FSU's Medical Response Unit is an example for many other universities, and it would be an honor to contribute to its founding success. Thank you for taking the time to meet with me. Oh, sorry, I was muted. The sponsor yields with 50 seconds left to her closing. We are now in a period of general questioning for the candidate. Senator Carr? I was just wondering, I read through your application, and I know you were saying that you would like MRU to gain more visibility. I was just wondering how you plan to do this. Yeah, so I have worked very closely with my director of special projects, Basically, that is kind of the more social side. So that's both planning outreach programs, that's tabling on Landis, that's for Market Wednesday, that's promoting on our social medias and really getting the name out there. We've also started up a new program called Greek Safe. So that is a program that was written by one of our responders who unfortunately is graduating this year. We'll miss her. But that is a great way to get our name out there. It basically teaches medical what to do in medical situations, whether that be alcohol poisoning, drug overdose, traumas, bleeding. It covers all of like the prehospital 911, all of those. I'm really trying to push more Greek safe push, stop the bleed. That's another certification that we teach. So we are stop the bleed instructors. As MRU students and as responders, we go out and we teach pre-hospital care to FIGS, to Greek Life, to a bunch of different organizations around campus. And I think that is a very important part that we have started this year, but we can always grow it more. And I'm really looking forward to working with my director of special projects and pushing that more. Thank you.

- Senator Randall: First of all, you guys are so awesome. Like you're your first response, our first responders on campus. So like, thank you for all that you do. But my only question is like, you have any plans kind of like speaking on that visibility aspect of things to work with any of like the other SGA organizations, like the mental health council could be a good one. And I remember like our innovation agencies, that sort of thing to kind of help to promote some of these kinds of events that you're talking about.
 - Candidate Donaldson-Pham: Yeah. I would love to work with different organizations, organizations, especially SGA organizations, as we are all a family. We are all together. I mean, we all have a special bond. Of course, we are all connected to all the organizations on campus, but especially all of us RSOs definitely need to work together to work on visibility. And I would love to partner with others. And that's something that I will make as part of my outreach is definitely using you guys as a resource to get in contact with those other RSOs and especially the candidate who just spoke today. I would love to talk to her about talking to the FIGS and all of those.
- Vice Chair Pu: Is there anything that you maybe just like saw that the MRU could do to improve the well-being of campus health? Like, as it relates to your position, your potential future position in the MRU?
 - <u>Candidate Donaldson-Pham:</u> Yes. There were a couple... Trying to word it correctly. There were a couple inconsistencies with dispatching times. When it came to the unit, it wasn't... For the

most part, it wasn't something that was on our end. It was more of the dispatch and Leon County dispatchers were not quite getting through to MRU. So we would have to kind of have our radios on So that's something that I'm trying to work with our faculty director, Mike Stewart, on talking to dispatch and having us looped in on that because that is the main point of why we're on campus is because we are such a pedestrian campus. So we can zoom up on our little golf carts and get to them a lot faster, stabilize the patient, help initiate that life-saving care quickly, more quick, in some cases quicker than Leon County EMS can get to us. So that is something that I definitely saw a little bit of a deficit in that I want to talk to Leon County Sheriff's Office about keeping us on that radio and dispatching us as well so we can intervene guicker.

- Senator Mckenzie: So I've seen your application. You talked about the Toys for Tots drive, the first annual one. How would you say that impacted the MRU standpoint on campus?
 - Candidate Donaldson-Pham: That was one of the first times that we really partnered with Greek Life. So we really leaned on our sororities and IFC in helping collect donations. That was our first. Kind of, I guess, our first kind of olive branch, if you will, trying to get them get our name out. We have a lot of responders who are part of Greek life, but we also wanted to expand a little bit more. And so that was something that kind of got our name out there. And I did see an increase in applications after, especially Greek applications after that, as people saw that we, yes, we initiate life support care on campus and yes, we do these outreach, but we also care about outside of FSU campus and we want to create a difference outside of just the walls of Florida State.

 - Senator Randall: Yeah, I mean, A, I trust the MRU's decisions to pick their own director because, again, they do so much for this campus. And, like, first of all, kudos to you because the fact that you're, like, literally a first responder and you're also willing to dedicate extra time to this organization to, like, be the director and do all of the outreach efforts, I just think is so, so, so commendable. And, you know, all these ideas and have all this passion for this, I think that you would do... nominal in this role.

Candidate for Confirmation: Sara Larancuent: Civic Engagement Board, Deputy Director

Opening Statement:

Candidate Larancuent: Hey guys, so I see a few familiar faces. To introduce myself, for those who don't know me, my name is Sarah Larroquant. I am majoring in political science and psychology. A little bit about me is that I'm extremely passionate about civic engagement and helping the school as well as the community around us. I made it a very big thing during my time in Senate to help the student body and the community. I went to a bunch of volunteering events around Tallahassee as well as donating calculators and textbooks for students who could not afford them. So that's a little bit about me. In terms of what I plan on doing within this position is I would like to increase voter education, whether it be voting times, educating those on local, state, and general election and all the candidates going up, I think it's very important. I would work alongside other RSOs such as OGA, College Dems, GOP, Florida PIRG, and all those types of groups in order to create events that would create awareness and have FSU have a higher voting turnout and advocate for those who are underrepresented. I would also serve as the chair of the Garnet and Gold Voting Commission. So there is where I would put all of these into effect. If anyone has any more questions, please feel free to ask. And yeah. Thank you.

- Senator Mckenzie: So you're talking about, like, voter turnout. Is that, like, just based on, like, Leon County or is that statewide?
 - <u>Candidate Larancuent:</u> Since this is for Ephesus County, it would just mostly be for, like, the school or the community, like, Leon County, essentially, and just getting people around the community to vote.
- Vice Chair Pu: Yeah, so there's, like, I've noticed there's, like, sort of a common issue around campus and potential active voters is, you know, they may their voter registration may not exactly line up with like, you know, where they're living in Tallahassee, like some people may be registered to live back home. And perhaps just because they're by effect of just not being there, they may be unfamiliar with a lot of like the local politics and a lot of the issues on the ballot. would, how would you try to encourage these voters who maybe are not as informed about what might be on their ballot to encourage them to still, that it is still important to vote, maybe even if they live, you know, a couple hundred or a thousand miles away?
 - <u>Candidate Larancuent:</u> For that, actually, I think earlier this year, I ran into that issue where I was informed that like, because like my voter address is still on my past address, But then I learned how to do it. So essentially, when I would when we would host these

events for the Civic Engagement Board, we would have like a stand, obviously, or people and like flyers that are going to tell you, like give you a QR code that could lead you to the voting website where you could change your address, which is how I did it. It was with I think it was People Power Florida where they were the ones who were advertising this. So we could definitely get them on board and actually have them give out the QR codes and be able to tell them. um you said something about, like, aligning I don't know if you meant with the reviews or if you meant with, like, solely just the address.

- Senator Randall: Hi. Sorry, I don't think camera's not on. I'm walking to a staff meeting. LOL. um but given that the engagement board is a very, very new entity, do you have any specific plans, kind of, um to help to increase the visibility? Because I know it's hard to kind of get turnout and things when you're a brand new org. I'm like, I guess, specifically asking that through the lens of you being the chair of the Garland Gold Bus Commission, because that's not necessarily a new thing. I know that has been successful in previous years. Sorry if that was like, um, okay, I'm gonna,
 - Candidate Larancuent: gonna, I don't really know what the question was. But if you could, just like increasing, like the visibility in general, because it's kind of difficult to like have good attendance to like any like sort of like educational event or whatever as a new org okay so for this, um, we will have a marketing chair. Um, we've talked to a few people who are, like, really good with social media, so we'd get out the word in social media. I, we would also have someone who would go to senate to inform, whether that be me or someone else on the board, and have them informed, as well as other RSOs, so the word should be spread out. I would also email the, um, advisors or like the ones who send the emails to make sure that the event is known and out there. We already had an avenues to advocacy event, and that was pretty well dispersed for the first event and like the whole panel and everything. And I would I also have an event that I plan on hosting, which essentially I would bring in a bunch of candidates who are running for office. So that would probably get more people interested in going to these events. I hope that answered the question.

- o Opening Statement:
 - Chair Goldstein: I guess I'm a candidate now. That's cool. Sponsoring the bill, excuse me. I'm just kidding. So... This is just a quick little update for rules of procedure, not rules of procedure, for us to be able to amend policies that we're creating by student body statutes through rules of procedure and through resolution. So right now we kind of set up this whole policy structure. So a lot of agencies and entities and SGA are now able to write their own policy and how they want to operate themselves. So we just passed this past Senate class councils and then that previous Senate before that we passed the exact branch stability. So they kind of have the ability to self-govern with policy. So we don't have to always update statutes every single time they want to make a small little change in their organization. But this also, this change secures us the ability to kind of go back through and edit any of those policies via resolution if we feel like they're kind of overstretching their powers or going too far with what they're doing. That's pretty much it. I know there was some opposition to this based on the exec branch, but I kind of worked it out with them. So we're good.

I like that we're codifying the fact that we are allowed to do things to these policies if we want to, which was kind of like implicit-ish before, but I think having this in writing is really good because like, God forbid, if there is somebody that wants to do something real bad or just puts it in their policy, now we have others that'd be like, hey, that's not okay for X, Y, and Z reasons. So I think this was an important thing to kind of right out as we are kind of transitioning into this new era for SGA.

 - Opening Statement:
 - Chair Goldstein: Hi, guys. So this is pretty much just not really clerical, but to make Senate a little bit more efficient. This is going to allow any bill that will transfer money between accounts that is not Senate projects will be able to put on the consent calendar. So right now, every time we go into the Senate, any agency or bureau that wants to transfer money between their accounts, a senator has to put up a bill for them. But then it has to go through the entire process of getting put on first reading, second reading, and then we have to debate it, then they have to go up and present it. But We've never actually ever failed a single one of those budget transfers. So this is now just allowing those budget transfers to be put on the consent calendar. So it doesn't have to go through the whole sponsor getting up, presenting for five minutes, us doing questions, all that stuff. It just gets put on the consent calendar and then we can unanimously adopt it by the Senate. So it's kind of fixing that really a long, antiquated process that we go through every single Senate meeting of going through the eight or so budget transfer bills that can pretty much just be done in like two minutes, pretty much just for efficiency. And then I also added a little thing in there about, measure legislation not being put on the consent calendar just for extra security. But that's about it. Thank you. I yield.
 - Round of Questioning:
 - Senator Randall: Real quick before I have to leave. Am I reading this wrong? Because I might just be stupid. It says anything from Senate product should not be on the consent calendar, right? Are we saying somewhere that any other things can be? Or is it just kind of like a saying that it can't be as important? Like, am I just missing this? Am I stupid?
 - Senator Goldstein: Yeah. So the way I wrote it is just implying that anything that is not Senate projects is able to be put on the consent calendar. It was just the easiest way of mass putting mass allowing any possible legislation that's a bill transfer without having to name every single individual piece that could go on the consent calendar. So it's kind of a catch all.

- Opening Statement:
 - Chair Goldstein: Hi, quys. This is simply like mainly clerical. I talked with Joseph McGorlick about this, our pro tempus Senate president. And we're just adding a lot of those things that currently normally have liaisons to represent them, but have just not been updated in rules of procedure to add them on there. And then I also added a little subsection that makes it so a senator shouldn't be serving as more as liaison to more than four entities kind of to make it so it's a fair game for all the senators that want to serve as liaisons. There's not just one center that has like 18 liaisons and is working with every single entity. And then I also added another little clause that the person who's working with the student body treasurer's office should be either the chair of budget or the chair of finance, just to kind of have that back and forth discussion. So they're actually in a position of authority and Senate to kind of make those changes that they want to see. The only ones that weren't already kind of guaranteed liaisons that i added was the office of fraternity and sorority life and then the four governing greek councils but just this past year they have had liaisons so i figured it would be good to include them but that's it i vield

- Senator Mckenzie: So you said that there's four, like a maximum of like four organizations that you can be the liaison for. Is that like in the bill? Because I do not see that at all. Yeah, it's number two, where it says the student Senate president shall not assign a senator to more than four entities to liaise with. Why did you choose four and like no less?
 - Chair Goldstein: So based on kind of this past year, I didn't see any senators, including myself, that were able to liaise with more than four entities. And as people like myself and previous chair Kosh that were able to liaise with four, that was like pretty much the hard cap. Like you do not have enough free time in your life to liaise with more than four entities. So I thought that was kind of a generous cap. I've never seen most senators will never actually liaise with more than one entity. Four is kind of a generous cap. I was thinking about even putting it at two or three, but I just want to make it a little bit more generous. I've never seen a senator be able to efficiently liaise with more than four entities. You kind of have a loss of quality once you get to that point.
- Vice Chair Pu moves to enter round-table discussion; Senator Stuart seconds
- Round-Table Discussion:
 - <u>Vice Chair Pu</u>: I would just like to speak upon the second point that we
