- Diaz: First of all, I just wanted to say hello to you all! I wanted to welcome you all back now that we have entered the summer session and I did want to apologize for all the delays in getting these meetings started. And I wanted to explain a little bit of why we are having a hiccup here. So, Statute 4 Report E states, and I can read it to you, says "the number of senators able to serve in term should not fall below 30. Should occasion rise where there are fewer than 30 student senators, SBP should make appointments to maintain 30 senators. In this case, the Senate and its committees may meet for the sole purpose of voting on new senators. So, with all of the senators that we have taking lead we have fallen down to 16 senators, which is less 30. So, we had to wait for a forwarding letter to be sent to us by the executive branch which we received last week, and all of those nominees on that forwarding letter have been invited here today. But before we get into nominations, I have been requested by President Hunter to address Dr. Hecht's veto of Bills 25, 30, and 55. Dr. Hecht veto's those bills in a letter from April 22nd and her objection to those three bills can be found in our canvas announcement, sent by Jacalyn. And then also available to the public via the Senate documents page. I've also been asked to enforce the one device policy that President Hunter put into place, where everyone here in person today should only be using one device whether that's a laptop or phone. You guys are doing great so far. And all of our Senators on Zoom, you are encouraged to have your cameras on. You are choosing to appear virtually so let's just keep that spirit in mind for active participation here today. We have a lot of things to get through this summer, we have 6 agencies of leadership we have to confirm, an entire cabinet of almost 20 people, an entire supreme court, and a couple of bureau nominations. So, we definitely have our work cut out for us this summer. So, I just wanted to thank all of you for showing up here today and I welcome all of the nominees that are here for confirmat6ion today. Thank you all to everyone that applied to be in the Senate and for being willing to serve to ensure that our Senate can operate this summer. Senate Confirmations:

Diaz: There are eleven people who were put on the forwarding letter from May 20th. Anybody who would like to look at those applications, those applications are available via the canvas page. They are listed under the forwarding letter from May 20th, 2022 and on that letter, we have Erick Rivers for Student Senate Fine Arts Seat 1, this is a fall seat, so this candidate will be serving not just summer but through the fall. Candidate Rivers, could you please raise your virtual hand so that we can see you up on the board. We have Cooper Lois for Student Senate Engineering Seat 1, for the summer, you can come up. We have Mahika Anand, for Student Senate Entrepreneurship Seat 1, this is a fall seat so they will be serving through the fall as well if you could please raise your virtual hand if you're here as well. We have Jake DeChick for Student Senate Business Seat 1; this is a summer seat – candidate DeChick if you could please raise your hand at this time. Cooper Riley for Student Senate Business Seat 3, summer only. I believe that candidate is not going to be here today. Ok, and we have Anthony Benn, Student Senate Arts & Sciences Seat 7, summer only. If they are here and could please wave their virtual hand so we can see it on the screen. We have four candidates on zoom and one in person, so the order I would like for our opening statements and our questioning to go would be to candidate Lois, Rivers, Anand, DeChick, and Benn in that order. So, candidates will have 5 minutes to make an opening statement. Any time that is left over from their opening statement can be used for a closing statement, after that we will enter a round of technical nondebatable questions, a round of general questions, and if the Senate chooses to it can enter a round of pro/con debate. So, with that being said, all of the candidates for Student Senate, you are all welcome to the floor.

Opening Statements:

<u>Candidate Lois</u>: Alright, I'm Andrew Lois, I'm an electrical engineering major cause it's
my junior year. I heard one of my friends say that they love the Student Senate, and I
just thought it would be a good way to get more involved and ingrain myself into the
Florida state community. I'm just very passionate about throwing myself into whatever I
deem appropriate for me to do and this is something I feel very passionate about.

- Candidate Rivers: Yes, Hello Senate, some of you already know me, I have had the pleasure of knowing a lot of you guys, so it's good to be back here. Sad to be on zoom, couldn't get in today, I just want to start off by saying that Senate is obviously something that is not new to me. I served the Spring semester in the Senate as the finance vice chair. The first week I got in, I went in with the ground running, I submitted my first piece of legislation, not even a week passed while I was in Senate before I passed my first piece of legislation. So, obviously this is something that I am passionate about, this is something that I put the work into this past spring semester, and this is something that I see the responsibilities in and see the good that can be done with this organization and this legislative branch of SGA, and I tried my best to make sustainable and equitable change during my time in spring Senate. I know there were a lot of cray moments during spring Senate, many people may have no agreed with certain actions of mine and to them I would apologize. I would apologize to everyone in Senate for my actions that they deemed inappropriate in some regard. There were times that I misspoke about certain pieces of legislation and that led to a whole kafuffle in Senate, and I would go beyond the Senate realms and that was never my intention. All of the legislation that I presented I saw as areas of improvement for campus, which is why I presented it and this is why I fought so hard to get it to pass and just have students that can understand where I was coming from in those aspects. I just see student Senate as an amazing pace of individuals who when we are able to put our minds together and fight together for change on campus, then it's just an amazing place and get done with everything we need to get done. I would love to be back in Senate, it was one of the best memories during spring semester, coming dressed up to Senate on Wednesdays, it gave me an excuse to wear a lot of things in my closet that I would have never worn before. So, I just wish to be back with you guys and that's about it, thank you.
- Candidate Anand: Good evening senators, my name is Mahika Anand, and I am so appreciative to have been forwarded to the Senate floor tonight as entrepreneurship seat 1. I held many leadership positions in high school and actively worked with teams to create and accomplish goals that addressed relevant issues for the high school community. I revamped or school's sports media program to highlight and include students who felt like their talents were going unnoticed. I started my high schools first south Asian student association to give a voice and safe space to the smaller Asian student body, I led my team to the National Level DECA conference and started a mental health week in school, which was so successful as a concept that it got local television coverage. This past year as a first year at FSU I have grown so much as an individual but also as a future entrepreneur. Though I haven't been involved in SGA, I have many friends who have inspired me to get involved with SGA. Especially after they saw my efforts within my sorority. I am a sister of the chi omega sorority here at FSU and this past year I took the time to see what aspects of campus life and Greek life I could get involved with but also help improve or make more effective. That is when I noticed the imbalance of power within the four Greek councils on campus and was able to become my chapters council relations chair. This position allowed me to work with the national Panhellenic council and the multicultural Greek council. The Greek communities usually geared towards students of color. After recognizing that my sorority had a platform to bring awareness to these 2 councils, I put my efforts towards educating my sorority on the history of the councils as well as making meaningful connections with leaders of both NPHC and MJC. With issues regarding women's health and safety taking center stage these days, one of my main goals is to make sure that us as student leaders can create a safe environment for the women of FSU. I hope to work with likeminded individuals in the Senate to strive to make the school the best it can be. Thank you for taking the time to listen to me today

- Candidate DeChick: Hi guys, hi Senate, first I want to thank the administration for forwarding us, not just myself but all the other candidates, especially for summer c and fall seats. This is not my first time in Senate, I served roughly a month and a half in the spring Senate, and it was honestly probably one of the best times I've had at Florida State in terms of being able to see what I can do as a student and help both students in my college of business as well as the general student body. I saw a lot of issues getting solutions and I saw within those solutions even more problems that could be solved within the summer Senate and other Senate sessions. I really just want to help be a part of that change, whether it's drafting the bills or even speaking in behalf in favor of other bills I think would just help change FSU for the better. I want to make sure that I participate and collaborate with other peers both virtually or in person if possible, to enact that change and make sure we leave this summer Senate better than it was when we found it. I think that as long as we have the bright individuals we have in Senate as well as the applicants, I think that we can do that, I would really value my time, thank you.
- Candidate Benn: Hi everyone, my name is Anthony Benn and before I start today, I wanted to thank everyone for the opportunity to speak today regarding my nomination. A little bit about me is I am not entering my sophomore year here at FSU and I was born and raised in Orlando, FL. Back home in Orlando at my high school, I had the honor of being in SGA all four years starting my freshman year and in SGA I got to hold multiple leadership roles, some of which were Freshman, sophomore, and student body president, and I believe these roles have prepared me for the position of what it means to be a student senator. Teaching me skills, such as financial planning, public speaking, and team work to name a few. The college of arts and sciences is important to me not just because it is my college, but because it is so many other people's college. And being able to represent and give back to my fellow classmates, whether that be through helping a student organization figure out financials for our project, effective outreach, and serve as a bridge between anything arts and sciences related in the student Senate. I'm really excited about this position and bringing new ideas and energy to it and with that I conclude my opening statement.

- Senator Tucker: So, this is for Senator Rivers. Good to see you back, Senator Rivers.
 What made you decide to come back? Do you have any goals in mind of what you wanted to accomplish in the time you'll be here?
 - o Rivers: Yes, thank you. I heard that PAC received a lot of extra money for to do stuff with. And with the installation of our new union, I would love to try to work with. I've been in contact with people at the University of Miami and Oregon, or Ohio or something like that, and talking to them about their professional headshot booth. And I want to try to get us a professional headshot booth in the union because that is something that's (inaudible) to people leaving the university. I look at LinkedIn all the time, and not everyone has a professional headshot photo and that's something that's the first thing that people see about you and things like that. And I also just wanted to better. I am a double major in both art history and fine arts, but I definitely want to shine light to the fine arts side more, especially talking with the people in my fine arts music council and talking with them about their experience with deans and getting opinions from them and the deans hearing stuff in one ear and it going out the other. So, I want to make sustainable change for fine arts, especially because it's one of the smaller colleges, but it's also one of the colleges that does the most stuff. They're always putting on shows, they're always putting on dances and performances and always giving back to the university in the field of the arts so, yes.
- Senator Folwell: Hi, yes. I just want to say welcome to all of our candidates. I was wondering - this is to everyone - do you have a preference for committee and if so which one is it?
 - o **Lois:** I currently have no preference of committee.
 - <u>Rivers:</u> Yes, so I served in finance, however, I love finance, but I think now it would be judiciary or budget. Judiciary because I want to really work to fine tune bills before they get to the floor. So, we are able to maximize- or minimize our time I should say. And budget. I know budget is coming up and I want to be able to give a different area of this campus their funding.
 - Anand: Thank you for the question, I would love to work with the student life committee and as I said I am still a little new to SGA but I think being able to work with student life would give me the opportunity to work with students I want to be more active and hands on with.
 - <u>DeChick:</u> Thank you for the question, I would have a preference for either the Budget Committee or Internal Affairs, I've worked with budget before and I've loved working with them and then I think that internal affairs, if budget is not available, would also serve to my skills well, thank you.
 - <u>Benn:</u> Hi, thank you for the question, a committee I think I would definitely like to work with would be Student Life. I am definitely new to SGA, but I've always loved working and talking to people and getting to hear their perspectives on different things and I feel like that encompasses student life, whether that'd be an

- organization that they're in and the projects that their organization has put on. So, that would definitely be my preference thank you for your question.
- Kaminsky: Yeah, I have a question for Senator Rivers. In your opening speech, you
 mentioned some conflicts on bills and I wanted to know if you were referring to Bill 25
 that recently got vetoed?
 - <u>Rivers:</u> No, I wasn't talking about that one specifically, I don't know the number of that one. The one I am referring to is the class council bill regarding them coming to Senate and I misspoke about speaking to a set group of individuals during a committee meeting.
- Kaminsky: Ok. And who were those individuals?
 - Rivers: It was said that I spoke to the current senior class council and the senior class council elect. I would just say I don't want to go too deep into it, but I will say that the minutes are available and it was just a crazy situation because I would love if there was more communication with me if there was an issue with something that I said. And I would love to work to rectify the situation more on all aspects. On a Senate aspect, an administration aspect, and a legislative aspect.
- Point of Clarification: President Diaz: Bill 33.
- Tucker: So, this one is directed to Candidate DeChick, it's a similar one to what I asked Candidate Rivers earlier. It's good to see you back, I was wondering what was your reason for coming back and do you have anything in mind that you wanted to target over the next little bit that we might have you here for?
 - One of the big goals I had in mind for my time in summer Senate. I was lucky enough to attend an SGA sanction leadership retreat and one of the big things that came out of that was bridging the gap between SGA and other facets of the student body. That being the student body itself as well as COGS. I've been in communication with a couple members of COGS, even attended a meeting myself to see how they work with things, and a big goal would be formulating a solution to bridge the gap between COGS and the general body, the Senate. Thank you.
- Casiple: Yes, point of clarification for candidate DeChick. What were you referring to by solutions? Solution to what exactly?
 - <u>Casiple:</u> I think I really just mean encouraging more synergy would be the best word. When I attended the meeting, I saw how they operated with things and- really just synergy and awareness of each other. Maybe if there's something going on in COGS, that might be something more pertaining to Senate, or that's something that Senate could help more with. That maybe something along those lines, just a better line of communication, thank you.
- Senator Tucker: Yeah, so this question is directed at senator Anand. You mentioned one
 to propose legislation to increase women's safety on campus which, I'm a big fan of that.
 I was wondering, how do you plan to use the powers granted to you as a senator to be a
 part of that? Whether it be legislation or money transferring, I just want to hear your part
 on that.
 - Anand: Yes, of course, thank you for the question Senator Tucker. So, one of the ideas, as I said, I'm not really familiar with SGA so I plan to use these summer meetings to learn about SGA and use it to benefit the student body and student life. But, one of the solutions that comes to mind when it comes to the

situation is obviously, I'd love to long-term work with senators and SGA to create more parking opportunities closer to campus, so that it's not just certain floors of parking garages that allow overnight parking. But, for a short-term goal, one idea I had is that I would love to create a temporary overnight Uber system, or kind of like curb caddy where throughout the night there are free rides throughout any of the parking garages there are free rides to help transport students to and from different locations all across campus. Because, when they're riding with someone its much safer and you don't feel like you're walking home alone at night and it will hopefully prevent students from having to walk alone at night, especially when its free. I would love to set aside some money to a service like that so that no student has to walk alone, especially when it comes to garages, like Woodward, Call street and St Augustine because walking home alone at night from those garages is not safe to say the least, so creating something like a curb caddy system would be beneficial I believe and I would love to work on that starting in the Senate.

- First Round of Pro on all candidates:
 - Tucker: Yeah, I think we all around have a really strong senator bunch with us today. We have some previous senators that have a lot of experience as well as we have some new people who have relevant experience, whether it be in high school or at FSU, we've heard some really good ideas tonight I think that this is a really good group that is coming in here, so that is my support.
 - Folwell: Yeah, I think this is a really solid round. We have a few people who already have that experience going in. They don't have to relearn the ropes which is really nice. And for those of the candidates that don't, they seem to be really passionate. Which I think, at the end of the day, we should look for in senators. So, I'm all for all of these candidates.
- First Round of Con on all candidates:
 - Draco replaces Garner as Pro Tempore.
 - Garner: So, I will try to keep my comments very short and precise, but very poignant. I think that candidate Rivers is very passionate about his work and also his time in the Senate. However, I do not think that he is deserving of a full term, a fall seat. Perhaps, if the seat he was applying for was for the summer only, that seems more logical, particularly pointing back to his earlier comments when he said he had allowed dysfunction here in the Senate and I think that is something that is (inaudible) myself. Other committee chairs that we want to make this environment as

friendly and as open as possible. And I think that his presence would be contradictive to that.

 - Anthony Benn is confirmed as Arts & Sciences Seat Seven.

Candidate Vossler, if you could please raise your hand. Okay. Candidate Fermin if you can raise your hand as well. So that we can acknowledge that you are here. *RECORDING INAUDIBLE* (00:50:10) Is candidate Rodriguez here? Rodriguez is here. Is that it?

Diaz: Candidate Vossler, if you can please. Okay, thank you. We are in the committee of rules. As a whole, we will continue with, we will continue with the same format as last time. Candidates have 5 minutes for their opening statement, any candidate that, any time that is left over from the opening statement can be used for a closing statement, which I forgot to give to the last candidate. And then we will be moved into a round of technical nondebatable questions, general questions, and then we can move onto a round of profound debate. So the order that we will go is very similar order to the one that we just went in. We have, we are going to be going in the order of candidate Bugallo, because you are in person, candidate Clermont, Rodriguez, Fermin and Vossler, in that order. So, we have candidate Bugallo for undergraduate seat 13, seat 17 summer only. Point senator Carrier.

And I am a rising second year junior, rising second year student majoring in public health, with minors in clinical science and economics. First, I would like to thank the executive board for nominating me to serve in the summer meetings of the summer board for student Senate for undergrad seat thirteen. Currently I am a member of, sorry, currently I am a member of Sisters Incorporated and SURGE, and this this past school year, I had the opportunity to partake in the undergrad research program here at FSU. My qualifications for this position, for this position are my experience as secretary, junior year, and president senior year for the Student Government Association at my high school, as well as, leadership positions, other leadership positions I held for various other clubs and organizations, such as historian for the National Honors Society and Student Ambassador for the When We All Vote Organization, organization. These roles instilled me with character, leadership skills, and fueled my passion for service. Which is why I decided to apply for Senate here at FSU. Becoming student senator RECORDING

I believe I am qualified for this position because of the time I have spent on my fraternity's executive board and was continuously elected and held the position of secretary for two terms over a period of two years. During that time, I was our president right hand man. I helped him with a lot of the administrative work such as briefing him on our chapter agenda and corresponding with our national headquarters and advisory board whilst also keeping track of all important documents and writing all chapter minutes.
