Bill 75 Sponsored by Senators Gorelick, Hine (P) Chehaitli (Co)

This bill provides revisions to attendance policies for Mandatory

Resolutions First Reading:

Resolution 55 Sponsored by Senator Pedraja (P) Arellano, Bevis, Hellman, Hirji, Kerley,

Randall, Sparling (Co)

This resolution acknowledges the need for efficient and effective

committee referral and consideration of legislation. It proposes amending

the Rules of Procedure to allow bills to be referred to multiple committees without a specific sequential order, requiring approval from all relevant committees to proceed, and removing bills that fail any assigned committee from the calendar.

Bills Second Reading:

Bill 66

Sponsored by Senator Bevis (P)

The Finance Code currently says that PAC and RTAC cannot fund events that are for executive boards only. However, an exception to this rule can be made by a 3/4 vote of either funding board. This bill will end that exception, banning PAC and RTAC money from being used for executive board only events. (Referred to Finance 06.28. Referred to Budget 06.28. Tabled in Finance 07.04. Tabled in Budget 07.07. Passed in Finance 07.18)

Bill 67

Sponsored by Senator Gorelick, Randall (P) Arellano, Baez, Bevis, Cofer, Fredock, Gessner, Gomez, Hellman, Hirji, Mendez, Olsson, Pedraja, Richards, Schwartz, Shaver, Sparling, Waldie, Waller (Co) This bill makes several changes to statutes concerning the Office of Governmental Affairs, making Board of Directors no longer a major office, updating the Board of Directors Selection Process, and overhauling the Legislative Agenda process. (Referred to Internal Affairs 07.12. Referred to Rules & Calendar 07.12. Referred to Judiciary 07.12. Passed Internal Affairs 07.17. Passed in Rules & Calendar 07.18. Passed in Judiciary 07.19. Tabled on the Floor 07.19)

Bill 68

Sponsored by Senator Fredock (P)

This bill provides a process for RSOs to receive money from the organizational fund, since any process is non existent is statutes. This bill also changes who may receive the organizational fund, making the fund serve as start-up funding for newly established RSOs that have previously not received money from SGA. (Referred to Finance 07.12. Referred to Budget 07.12. Passed in Finance 07.18)

Bill 69

Sponsored by Senator Fredock (P)

This bill makes several tweaks to the funding board procedure to be fairer and more transparent for RSOs requesting funding. This bill also changes how spending limitations for each RSO are handled. (Referred to Finance 07.12. Referred to Budget 07.12. Failed in Finance 07.18)

Bill 71

Sponsored by Cofer (P) Hellman, Pedraja, Randall (Co) Removal of the Student Council for Accessibility Advocacy (SCAA) from Student Body Statutes (SBS) as a result of Executive Order 7804's creation of the Student Accessibility Commission. (Referred to Judiciary 07.12. Passed in Judiciary 07.19)

• President Cofer relinquishes the Chair.

Opening Statement:

Cofer: SCAA is a current Bureau in statutes and must come to Senate to make changes. This puts Statutes in line with current Rules of Procedure (Executive Order 7804's creation of Student Accessibility Commission). Because statues were so rigid, SCAA was not able to fulfill its purpose. This Executive Order makes things more flexible and performs realignment.

The purpose of the Uniform Agency Act is to establish a common set of rules and roles for all agencies under the Student Government Association, ensuring a unified approach to serving the diverse student body. Each agency, while maintaining its unique identity and focus, will adhere to these uniform rules, promoting consistency, fairness, and transparency across all agencies. When an elected Senator is not inaugurated by the third Senate meeting following the respective election cycle's inauguration ceremony, the seat will first be offered to the Senator Elect's prior runner-up before being
