Special Introductions and Announcements:

- State of the Student Body Address, President Gabadage: Good evening and thank you. Today marks nearly six months since my inauguration and I want to express how grateful I am to represent you all. I am reminded daily of the honor I have to work on your behalf. I ensure you I am committed to our student body the same way I was on day one. Our community, University, and nation have experienced a variety of adversities. We've been confronted with challenges, but we are moving forward together to reach new highs. In conversations with individuals from other institutions, they know that Florida State is a remarkable place and they know our dominance in athletics, our uniting traditions, and our academic abilities. They know of our willingness to engage in fruitful discourse with a free, democratic student government. They can never put a finger on what makes FSU all these things. All those associated with this remarkable place know exactly what I'm referring to. Unconquered – this word defines the resiliency of the Seminole people and their struggle for freedom, and the unique mentality of our University. We carry ourselves with the spirit that proves to be a guiding light in moments of uncertainty. Our unconquered spirit is the core of our motivation. When we're juggling working part-time and studying for exams, looking to find funding for RSO's, and when supporting a charity, we remain unconquered. We will use these valuable moments as lessons to excel in unimaginable ways – they've provided us a moment of self-reflection. Our administration is hard at work, striving to serve our student body with the utmost dedication and passion. With the waning of the pandemic and return of the Student Union, we have begun a renaissance for student life. FSU students can have an impact on our broader communities. We are working to engage engagement through the Garnet & Gold Votes Commission, working with OGA as a non-partisan to engage key stakeholders. The work of OGA will continue to change in the interest of FSU students in all levels of government. Our administration will work closely with the leadership of OGA to pursue initiatives for the upcoming legislative session. Tallahassee is one of the most academically diverse cities in the nation – having three universities to help us create a convergence of academic prowess. Our administration has taken steps to formalize this relationship. Our student leaders will engage in dialogue to coordinate and realize joint programming and advocacy. FSU must do its part to maintain sustainability in all areas. Our administration is approaching the issue of food insecurity head-on. We will engage in dialogue with 'Feeding Florida.' This program will be focused on maximizing SNAP benefits while introducing sustainable grocery alternatives – this partnership could allow students to double benefits at participating stores and farmers' markets. We are taking steps to increase the use of campus public transportation – restructuring unused parking spots to introduce real-time bus trackers at all campus parking garages. We are reviving the 'SGA Today' pamphlet, making it digitally available to make the inner workings of SGA accessible. We are redefining our media and communication strategy. Our administration has established the NOLES coalition. We can create a unified and dynamic cooperative. Our administration is also committed to being transparent – we will continue to make ourselves available to create an inviting environment which is important to make meaningful investments to allow the next generation to build off our work. The establishment of an SGA Internal Review Commission would evaluate the operational integrity of every institution within our association. It is important they receive

the necessary assistance to realize their goals. We can continue to invest in our future by making academic success resources equally and readily accessible. The introduction of a comprehensive guide to our existing resource network is near completion to relieve pressure on students. Recommendations on how to expand the resources will increase efficiency. We have made available the FSU GPA calculator on your myFSU Portal. Our administration has had dialogue with ACE Learning Studio, CARE, to evaluate the feasibility of expanded tutoring options. It has been a goal of the previous administration which we continue to enhance to make course syllabi available prior to registering for courses. We believe this will allow students to make more informed decisions. We must continue to champion initiatives that address inequalities while striving to educate our unique identities. Our administration is focused on establishing a network of active allyship with local organizations. I made a commitment to leaving our SGA and University better than when I found it. I'd like to thank the people who have been the driving force. I look forward to advancing the mission of this administration with your help.

- Judiciary
 - Resolution 59 and Bill 74 passed unamended this past Tuesday (09/20).

Senate Confirmations:

- Jason Puwalski – Office of Governmental Affairs, Director (2 applicants)
 - Opening Statement:
 - I'm a junior majoring in public science and public relations. I'd be happy to answer any questions you have. I wasn't here last week; I was at a

conference representing FSU. I'm excited to work with those already confirmed, as I worked with them last year as well. I'm excited to see what we can do together. I hope to build on our success and initiates from last year.

○ Technical Non-Debatable Questions:

- None.

○ General Questioning:

- DuChêne: In April you attended a Bill singing and expressed public support for SB-7044. Do you remember expressing your support for that Bill?
 - I went – but not in connection with my internship with the Governor's Office – I think I posted something to express support.
- DuChêne: That Law increases the required threshold on the Board of Trustees on questions of fee increases. **RECORDING INAUDIBLE** (00:41:46). A number of people in this Body have supported a reasonable increase to this fee. This extends the inability of us to adequately serve our students. My question is would you in your capacity of Director of OGA, should the Board agree, advocate for the appeal of this specific measure?
 - I only have some basic facts about the Bill. I know it increases the threshold. Anytime you ask students to pay more money there should be a good reason. Although I expressed support for this Bill on a personal basis, OGA did nothing to advocate for this Bill. In my capacity as Assistant Director of OGA we did not come out against it, but I know we did not publicly support it. I agree there should be an increase in A&S fees. That's something I'd be open to having a conversation with our Student Body President who sits on the Board of Trustees. That was one small provision of the Bill. Overall, I think it's a very good Bill. I think anytime you ask students to pay more you there should be a good reason.
- DuChêne: OGA also advocates for faculty and the same Bill adds a provision that allows the Court of Governors to impose an additional tenure review process every five years on top of the **RECORDING INAUDIBLE**. The Florida Statewide Faculty Union has come out against this specific measure of the Law and has all Florida faculty members already undergone an extensive tenure review process regardless of their tenure status – already held accountable by their peers and employers. By instituting this tenure review this makes our tenure system one of the most interfering in the country, making FSU more difficult to recruit the best in academia. Would you in your capacity advocate for the repeal of this Bill.
 - First, I did nothing to advance this legislation, OGA did nothing to advance this legislation, so I feel I'm being asked questions about something that was out of my control. Second, I think tenure is important – I think there needs to be some sort of review process. I think the five-year review is a good one. I don't see an issue with that process. I'd be happy to take another look at that with OGA if there is a concern with Senators or anyone who brings anything to OGA. I don't think instituting another review for tenure is an issue. I think you mentioned that this measure hinders the ability to bring

talent to our University, I think it does the opposite as when you have people who come in as Professors knowing they will be held at a higher standard, they know that the State of Florida is holding them to a high standard. I don't think that was an accurate representation of what's happening.

- DuChêne: The reason I ask these questions is because this Bill was extremely controversial in academia, especially among professors as the Faculty Union pretty much unanimously came out against it. Could you assure this Body that your previous work in the Governor's Office or personal opinion will not affect the legislative agenda for OGA.
 - I'm involved in a lot of organizations on campus with different viewpoints. I don't have a problem with opposition and input from others or working with anyone. Two organizations I'm involved in: Power of WE which I'm involved in as **RECORDING INAUDIBLE** (00:48:43) how I am keeping my views outside of OGA, where we represent ourselves over the student body. I don't think telling you my affiliation of organizations should dissuade your concerns, rather my actions should dissuade your concerns. Last year I was on the Board of OGA, and I can tell you there were few people I agreed with, but we worked things out. I have my personal views but understanding the nature of the position and how it represents the student body will portray how I view things, and it will be similar to last year.
- St. Hilaire: I love how OGA advocates for all students. The mission of OGA is to provide FSU students with representation and advocacy within the University community at all levels of government. How can you assure that will be done at all times?
 - Last year we tried to enhance what we were doing in relation to other years. We included the last part you mentioned to expand on what we do – not just focusing on the state-level. This year I hope to enhance what we've done on the federal level. Last year we tried to do something at City Hall and built relationships within the Mayor's Office to lay the groundwork for future agenda items. We will be working at all levels of government. We already have three people with me on the Board for this year if confirmed and have a lot of experience. We were able to do it last year so we can do it again this year.
- Carter: How as the OGA Director are you going to be intentional about selecting OGA Board Members representative of the identities of all students?
 - As part of the mission statement of OGA that we are representing every member of the student body – it's not just me – I want to do that with my colleagues. We will see what applications come in, conducting interviews, and selecting members. We're going to take it like a normal application and interview every applicant and we may not even know who applies – we're required to interview every applicant. We will be mindful of how well the applicants can separate their personal opinions from what they're intended to do in OGA. I'm not going to ask them what their political views are; I'm going to base it off judgement and how well we can separate personal and professional abilities. We work together very well. **RECORDING INAUDIBLE** (00:58:46).

- Bettley: In Internal Affairs you mentioned you weren't comfortable stating your goals for OGA as you don't have a twelve-person Board. What are some things OGA did last year that you would like to see this year?
 - I don't think that's exactly what I said. I do have my own priorities, but I wasn't comfortable stating to the Internal Affairs Committee that this is what I want to get done as we don't have a full board yet. After this confirmation I will hopefully consult with Emma and Omer and see what our priorities are. What we did last year was we got to see what all twelve Board members thought and make our priorities from there. As we're already late in the year, I want to get some of those out of the way and would expect input on those priorities from those other nine members. We need to get started ASAP. We only have five months to get everything we want to get done for a year's worth. We built relationships with the Mayor's Office, but we weren't able to execute that plan which I hope to revisit.
- Rivers: You said earlier that had issues with the Board last year, can you speak on some of those?
 - I don't recall saying that.
- Rivers: You said you had some disagreements with other members of the OGA Board, can you talk about those?
 - I think I said our political views didn't all align but I don't think I said we had disputes.
- Folwell: For those nine General Board members, are there any specific qualifications you're looking for, and is there anything you would veto in a candidate?
 - We want to restructure the Board. The nine at-large Board members don't have explicit responsibilities given to them. The responsibilities given to them are by the other three members of the Board, saving us time to work to our strengths. Qualifications I would be looking for vary on responsibilities, such as I wish to ramp up our social media presence with the consulting of the other Board members. I think we had five-hundred followers on Instagram and I hope to get over a thousand while doing more. I think we can do better with graphic design. I'd like to see OGA writing op-eds to spread out messages to the student body and sending news releases such as 'Day at the Capitol.' For our Social Media Coordinator, they should have already run a social media page and have experience. I'm not expecting every member of the Board to want to run for Office or have interned in a legislative office or want to go to law school. I want to make sure we are playing to our strengths. I also want to lay out criteria for each position, working with Omer and Emma on what that criterion is.
- **Schindler moves to enter Pro/Con debate on the Candidate, Hockett seconds.**
 - **No objections.**
 - **Senate is now in Pro/Con debate on the Candidate.**
- First Round of Pro:
 - Point of Information: Rivers to Candidate Puwalski: Can you tell me about a time last year in your position with OGA you disagreed with the rest of the Board?

- As a Board we all took the Oath we took to represent the student body very seriously. I don't think we had any significant disagreements. Our disagreements we did have were never arguments – particularly due to the virtual nature of what we did. I remember on one occasion, one Bill sponsored by Senator Brandis, some of us thought we should support and others thought we should have left it off, and we ended up leaving it off. I think that's the extent of any disagreement we've had. Overall, we work well together.
- Point of Personal Privilege: Tucker: There have been some questions asked about the candidate's belief regarding politics.
- Point of Information: Rivers to Candidate Puwalski: Can you explain that Bill was and in your position on the Executive Board the stance you took on putting said Bill on the agenda:
 - I'm happy to answer all questions, as I understand the importance of this position. It was a Bill; I can't remember if it passed. I don't remember the name or number of it, but it was related to higher education – which are the only bills we deal with in OGA. One of the things it did was revise how Universities select new University Presidents by providing guardrails to increase the talent pool of applicants to universities in the state. I don't remember any more specifics. I supported the Bill and suggested we investigate putting it on the legislative agenda. Others on the Board thought we shouldn't put it on the legislative agenda. No one thought we should put it on the agenda in opposition. One or two others thought we should support it and others thought we should leave it off the agenda, and we ended up leaving it off. That was a very average situation on the Board. There wasn't a lot of disagreement on many Bills we dealt with. We always come out in opposition of is campus **RECORDING INAUDIBLE** (01:21:35).
- Hockett to Candidate Puwalski: I think he is well intentioned and has chemistry with individuals already presiding on the Board. Candidate Goeckel came well-prepared and has experiences from this role, and Candidate May is just doing a title change as he already is fulfilling this role.
- Point of Information: Maglin to Candidate May: I'm a pre-med student but most of the general body doesn't know what the MRU has to offer, so what will you do to make the student body more aware of the MRU?
 - There's politics on the phone number you call because we're through FSUPD. We are promoting the 'Stop the Bleed' campaign and being pushed to other organizations to increase our awareness, but our social media presence has expanded exponentially as well.
- Folwell: I'd like to speak in favor of Candidate May. I don't know him as well as I'd like but I know many people who are friends with him and have heard many good things. I believe the MRU is one of the most tangible organizations SGA sponsors and funds, and the candidates should be passionate about that project.
- Tucker: I'm in Pro of all the candidates, one of my good friends is in MRU and loves it. Candidate Puwalski has done phenomenal and has given well backed-up answers while remaining confident – which is what we need.

- Schindler: I'd like to speak in Pro of Candidate Puwalski as he can separate his professional life from his personal life, and I've seen him succeed in D.C. and hope to see him as the next Director of OGA.
 - Diaz: All these candidates are super qualified but I want to speak on Puwalski. I volunteered with OGA. The issues OGA talked about are not controversial. These are not politically charged issues and I think the Board does a good job advocating for things that unify the student body. He's one person on a board of twelve.
- First Round of Con:
- Point of Information: Rivers: Is the Bill the one where the state hid information in regard to the selection of University Presidents?
 - I would not characterize it in the same way. I don't have the Bill so I don't feel prepared to answer this question so feel free to fact-check – but this is my characterization of the Bill from my recollection. The Bill was sponsored by Senator Brandis and served to increase the talent pool of Presidential candidates for the University. I'm not sure of the exact process but the Board of Trustees has a big role in selecting that candidate. When have a candidate applying for such a high position, because of Sunshine Law, their names are all released and there is a time limit and deadlines to ensure transparency. Whether in a political position – President Thrasher was a politician and we've have had several politicians as Florida State's President – who aren't necessarily notifying their constituents, it puts them in a difficult position and it drives away applicants. I was in a Senate Committee meeting when it was debated and did not speak in favor or against, but just happened to be there. Where I'm from, Florida Gulf Coast University (FGCU) is local. The President of FGCU came to Tallahassee to that Committee meeting and spoke on that Bill of how he saw the positive effects of it, and how it would've helped him. He's retiring this year and had strong interest for the good things of that Bill for the process. When President Thrasher was up for his position there was a lot of concern about that as well. This Bill wasn't a thrown-out solution – there was a direct problem and a solution to solve that, bringing more qualified applicants. I think the best solutions solve actual problems.
 - Point of Clarification: Schindler: I just read the Bill and don't think the goal was to **RECORDING INAUDIBLE** (01:30:51).
 - **Diaz moves to call the question, Hockett seconds.**
 - **No objections.**
 - **The question is called on the Candidate.**
- Closing Statement:
- Thank you for the questions. We need someone who has experience already. Last year being on the Board was the beginning of my SGA experience as most of my Senate experience was over the summer. I saw how we interact with our state government, which was compounded by my internship with the Governor's Office – was not political and had no connection with anything I did in OGA. I'm very grateful to be at FSU with Bright Futures and being in the state with the number one college system in the country. It would be more difficult for all of us without those items. I

want to make sure I'm representing the Student Body to the best of my ability in a non-biased fashion, exactly what we did last year and what we will do it again. I explained my association in other organizations like Power of WE. I'm asking you to look at my actions, and that's up to you to determine. If you saw anything that OGA did last year or knew anyone on the Board last year, what we were dealing with isn't controversial. With topics such as campus safety, food insecurity and Bright Futures, I think we're all in agreement. I really appreciate the questions even if a lot had to do with ideology. I understand as a Senator, I was in the Judiciary Committee, and appreciate you doing your job. I hope I've proven that I'm doing the same good work just like last year. Student Body President Gabadage gave us our first task working on the Garnet & Gold Votes Commission. A lot of my experience is going to help me here and I'm excited to pick a Board of qualified applicants. I helped to pick the Board last year even though I didn't agree with them on a lot of things. OGA does not deal with partisan issues.

- Kaitlin Goeckel – Pride Student Union Secretary (5 applicants)
 - Opening Statement:
 - Good evening, my pronouns are they/them. I am a second-year major in psychology with a minor in marine studies. Thank you for meeting with me today and thank you to the Internal Affairs (IA) committee and Pride Student Union (PSU) for nominating and forwarding me. Today I am here as PSU Secretary nominee. Many of my past experiences in leadership have provided me with a lot of skills and similar responsibilities. In high school I served as a teaching assistance for a theater program and had a lot of overlapping responsibilities, such as creating and programming events. I also serve as a Social Justice LLC Ambassador and Student Change Peer Educator at the RISE Office, familiarizing me with systems FSU uses for organization. I've also gotten a lot of leadership experience in planning events. PSU is an agency that heavily corresponds to my identities and values. I want to better the PSU and Tallahassee community. Thank you for your time.
 - Technical Non-Debatable Questions:
 - None.
 - General Questioning:
 - Tucker: I want to know a characteristic that makes you an efficient worker and leader?
 - I am very communicative. It's important to hear diverse perspectives and people's opinions to fully understand all factors that go into decision making. I try to make sure to see what is best for all in the community and compromising on that.
 - **RECORDING INAUDIBLE** (00:54:50) Can you expand upon the gender inclusive clothing drive you mentioned?
 - My idea was that gender-inclusive clothing could express individual's gender identity, which would be helpful for a lot of people. When I was figuring out my own identities clothing was a big part of that process.

- Tucker: What's something new you can bring to your position?
 - I would create the newsletter. I would introduce a new section focusing on the intersectionality of students' identities. For example, February could be a section on Black History Month and promoting collaboration.
 - Closing Statement:
 - Thank you for allowing me to speak tonight. I intend on doing my work through leveraging my previous positions. Thank you so much.
- Christopher May – Medical Response Unit Executive Director (1 applicant)
 - Opening Statement:
 - Good evening, I am a senior. I was elected to this position in March of last year from our General Body, so I understand the position. A lot of my leadership experience has been with the National Neuroscience Honors Society here. My junior year I was the President of that organization and spoke of different career paths. The MRU is the reason I came to FSU and the best in the state. We've achieved first place at ClinicCon for the past five years. I've been in the unit since my sophomore year. This past year I served in various committees – I understand how the unit works. To fund Who We Play For at FSU for their FSU Women's Health Day.

We will be helping them fulfill one of their goals to provide EKG testing. With Women's Health Day on October 17th, they will be partnering with the College of Medicine to provide 350 EKG tests. They have lowered the EKG cost to \$20 per EKG. One out of 300 people screened have a fatal heart condition, so this will directly be saving lives. They were originally requesting \$8,545 to cover 350 EKGs at \$20 per EKG and tent infrastructure to be set-up on Landis Green. They do not want to miss out on the opportunity and will be performing EKG tests. PAC decided to fund the full amount \$1,546 for tent infrastructure and 60 EKG tests at a cost of \$1,200. That brings the total amount to \$2,746 for this line-item. They can fundraise through other means which is why we lowered the amount and have fundraised \$200 themselves and estimate to receive \$500 via partnering with the College of Medicine. They are advertising through flyers and their social media, and the PAC budget would be \$77,861. Thank you.

Bill 75 Sponsored by Senator Folwell and Senator Wyatt (P) Barrett, Bettley, Boisvert, DuChêne, Hockett, Pedraja, Schindler, St. Hilaire, Suarez (Co)
 This bill increases the maximum amount of funding that PAC can give towards clothing and allows Senate to override that maximum if two-thirds of the Senate sees it fit to do so. **(Referred to Student Life and Finance 09.14. Passed in Student Life 09.16. Passed in Finance 09.16.)**

- Opening Statement:
 - Wyatt: When I ran for PAC Chair, one of my goals was to increase shirt funding. Senator Folwell helped me create this Bill. This increases funding by \$2 in each category – increasing sizes small through XL from \$8 to \$10. And for sizes XL and above from \$10 to \$12. It's hard for RSO's to get funding on quality t-shirts as not enough funding in today's economy.
 - Folwell: I put in that last clause which is standard in the Finance Code.
