Senator T. Murray led the Senate in the Land Acknowledgement:

The Student Government of Florida State University acknowledges that it is located on land that is the ancestral and traditional territory of the Apalachee Nation, the Miccosukee Tribe of Florida, the Muscogee Creek Nation, and the Seminole Tribe of Florida. - Judiciary, report made by Chair Little: Met Tuesday at 7pm. Amended and passed Bill 53, tabled Bill 51.
- Internal Affairs, report made by Chair T. Murray: Met Monday at 6:30pm, heard and forwarded 5 candidates. Hoping for a smaller forwarding letter this week because we have been receiving everyone in our committee to be heard, even if they are not required to be heard by us. Talking with Executive Branch to ensure we are not taking extra steps and wasting time.
- Budget, report made by Chair Gonzalez: Met yesterday at 6pm, passed Bill 52. Will meet again next week at 6pm to go over Budget Week and hear Resolution 67.

 - Harmon: Finance met right before the meeting and there was not time for the Clerk to update the calendar.

- Opening Statements:
 - Lugo: Would like to get more involved with LGBT community on campus, get to know more people, make campus safer and more welcoming for LGBT people.
 - Putnam: Collaborative and hardworking. Worked as Project Lead for a marketing project for the Ronald McDonald House, a non-profit that supports cancer patients and their families. Collaborated with peers, teachers, and employees to create a successful program to recruit volunteers. Developed effective leadership skills and learned how to give quieter voices the

attention they deserve. Passionate and excited to get involved in undergraduate research myself, and have experience with public relations. Created an enticing social media page for Ronald McDonald House. New to FSU and already identified opportunities to make a difference, such as starting a club for students to get involved in applied research. Market Wednesdays are overwhelming and confusing, so this would be a safe and calm place for students to get one-on-one advice on getting involved. Will be an effective planner, leader, and communicator while being an SGA representative in other spaces I am involved in.

- Herrerias: Have research experience; served in UROP for 2 years, helped with lab pairings, on the research committee for Power of We developing intervention programs, working as a research assistant, and got published 2 weeks ago. Have learned through my research opportunities that these opportunities do not have a standard and are available to everyone. Encourage students to step outside their comfort zone.
 - Marcus: **POI**, what position is this candidate being heard for?
 - Rowan: working to figure out if the candidate's nomination for Mental Health Council Vice President of Outreach requires Senate confirmation.
 - Marcus: **POC**, this candidate was not confirmed last week for any position, contrary to what Parliamentarian Rowan said earlier.
 - Harmon: Then why is this candidate on the floor?
 - T. Murray: **POC**, this candidate was supposed to be heard last week for Mental Health Council Vice President of Outreach, and she was absent. Currently verifying that the position needs confirmation. We need to here this candidate for the Student Council for Undergraduate Research and Creativity Assistant Director & Editor-in-Chief of the OWL position.
 - Rowan: Mental Health Council Statutes for the position in question references Statute 202.1 Guidelines for Student Senate Confirmation. Because of this, advises that this position requires confirmation. The candidate is up for confirmation for both positions tonight.
 - Harmon: So there are 3 positions for 1 candidate?
 - Rowan: 2 positions for 1 candidate. Student Council for Undergraduate Research and Creativity Assistant Director & Editor-in-Chief of the OWL is one position.
 - Harmon: So she was not confirmed for Mental Health Council last week?
 - Rowan: Correct.
 - Randall: **POI** for the Chair of Internal Affairs Committee, was Candidate Dolorit interviewed for the Student Council for Undergraduate Research and Creativity Assistant Director & Editor-in-Chief of the OWL position?
 - T. Murray: Yes.
 - Randall: And for the Mental Health Council Vice President of Outreach position?
 - T. Murray: Yes. Forwarded for the Mental Health Council position on Monday, then received the forwarding letter on Thursday for the new position.
 - Harmon: **POC**, Candidate Dolorit has been forwarded for 2 positions. Student Council for Undergraduate Research and Creativity Assistant Director & Editor-in-Chief of the OWL, which is a major office.
 - Marcus: **POI**, which position are we hearing the candidate for now?
 - Harmon: start with Student Council for Undergraduate Research and Creativity Assistant Director & Editor-in-Chief of the OWL.
- Dolorit: This position would enable me to supply the opportunities that SCURC supplied me. Hope to foster relationships with a team of undergraduates interested in creativity and research. Have an assortment of experiences and skills that translate to this position. Editor in the Florida Senate, leadership in several organizations, and been published through the OWL and other organizations. Hope to aid SCURC in all endeavors with my skills and facilitate an inclusive environment that engages students in research. Familiar with the difficulties surrounding research and want to make it an easier process.

Ana Dolorit for Mental Health Council Vice President of Outreach

- Opening Statement:
 - Dolorit: Care a lot about this position as well. Through my experiences, became a skilled conversationalist, which will help in this position. Navigating leadership positions during the pandemic has prepared me for this position. Hope to change the conversation around mental health because it has become predictable and stagnant; only a few ailments are highlighted, and there is little discussion about how some demographics are affected more by struggles with mental health or the intersectionalities in mental health struggles.
- Questions:
 - Randall: POI, are we in questioning right now?
 - Harmon: yes.
 - Randall: What is the purpose of the Mental Health Council?
 - Dolorit: To facilitate students' mental health journeys during their time at FSU and get people engaged in nuanced conversations. FSU provides a lot of resources on the surface, but the conversation is predictable but taboo. Gateway for students to feel more comfortable talking about and bettering their mental health.
 - Randall: Can you tell me more about your leadership style and how it plays into conflict resolution?
 - Dolorit: Very self-aware, which helps me delegate to others when I cannot take on a task. As president for another club on campus, delegated tasks to accommodate for this meeting tonight. Aware of my biases and this helps me navigate a group of diverse individuals.
 - Hunter: Given that we are now hearing you for a second position and you just expressed that you are president for another organization, can you describe how you plan to manage your time and how you plan to give your all to each organization?
 - Dolorit: Involved in a few things, would be involved in more but homing in on passions since it is senior year. Left executive positions in other clubs to prioritize my other club, a vegan RSO on campus, and these 2 positions I am being confirmed for tonight. Time management must

be actively implemented daily, know when I have things to do and look at things by priority. Trust those I delegate to that they will meet the requirements I cannot meet.

- Randall: The sole duty for the Director of Outreach is to assist the Deputy Executive Director in the effective operation of the Mental Health Council. Can you describe a project you have taken lead on, the outcomes of that project, and what you learned from the experience?
 - Dolorit: In Women's Student Union, hosted Instagram Live segment called Triple Es with Ana in which I educated, empowered, entertained with small episodes. Talked about issues, trends, and current events. Wanted to cater to the trends of student engagement, social media.

- Closing Statement:
 - Dolorit: Mental health issues are nuanced and there is much work to be done. Apt in communication; will communicate internally and externally. Would take this position very seriously, hope to have the chance to prove that.

Caroline Ball for Student Council for Accessibility Advocacy Assistant Director, Jack Rowan for PAC, Virginia Remington for Student Senate Press Secretary

- Opening Statements:
 - Ball: 3 main things: listen, analyze, speak out. Listening to people is about spending time with people, knowing that those around you are affected by you, hearing stories. Hearing what other people want and finding ways to help them. In the disability community, many are used to advocating alone and it is important to stand by their side. Without having any physical disability, hard for me to know what they want and how they see life without listening. Important to ask what I can do to help them feel included and happy.
 - Rowan: Grateful to have attended several PAC meetings with the hospitality of Chair Roy. The 2 funding boards are doing the most important work of SGA for RSOs. PAC has gone above and beyond what Statutes require, going as far as to ensure that RSOs have a room to host their events. Want to help with this tireless work as a full member. PAC technically does not have quorum right now.
 - Remington: Executive Assistant at a marketing firm in Tallahassee; experience creating content for the public. Passionate about content creation. Goals for this position are to increase engagement and following on social media and have a set calendar for posting times.
- Questions:
 - Marcus: For Candidate Rowan, are you fiscally certified for the 2021-2022 year?
 - Rowan: Yes, got certified shortly after the exam opened for the new year.
 - Hunter, with reservation for 2 follow-ups: For Candidate Remington, As Senators we have a vested interest in your confirmation; will you commit to attending events that the Senate is invited to, taking photos so it looks like we do more than just sit in this room, what time availability and commitment can you make to the Senate to attend these events we participate in and share these pictures on social media?
 - Remington: Only big time commitment is work. Flexible.
 - Hunter: For Candidate Remington, What do you see is the biggest challenge to Senate's brand on campus, whether through social media or our reputation?
 - Remington: Inconsistency in posting on social media, have not posted a Senator of the Month since June. Senator social media takeovers as well.
 - Hunter: For Candidate Remington, how do you plan to engage with Senators while in this position?
 - Remington: Have Senators share tips or participate in a live Q&A.

- Randall, with reservation for 2 follow-ups: For Candidate Remington, what firm are you working with?
 - Remington: Private 42.
- Randall: For Candidate Remington, what is your experience with social media calendars?
 - Remington: Business profile analytics are insightful and very helpful in deciding a routine posting schedule.
- Randall: for Candidate Remington, How do you think knowing these analytics will boost engagement?
 - Remington: Knowing what day and time is best to post and having Senators repost it or hosting Senator spotlights will boost engagement and following.
- Tackett: For Candidate Rowan, Do you think your position as Parliamentarian will interfere with serving on PAC?
 - Rowan: Not at all. Would not be the first time that an officer of Senate also served as a member of PAC; Chair Roy served in PAC during his term as Clerk of the 72nd Senate. Already go to PAC, this confirmation is to formalize my involvement.
- Bowling, for Candidate Ball, can you explain the relevant experience you have for this position and relevant projects?
 - Ball: Have a learning disability, so in high school was put in separate room for tests, along with people who lived with other disabilities. Was also involved in Student Government in high school, so they would talk to me about their wishes. Passionate about equality and would work on projects to help those in wheelchairs or on crutches be able to participate. Friend who was at FSU over the summer talked about her difficulty getting around. Also participate in Dance Marathon. Buddy system for people with disabilities to build community and promote listening.
- Stults: For Candidate Rowan, what makes you qualified for this position?
 - Rowan: Been to multiple PAC meetings, and very familiar with finance code as Parliamentarian. Work in Senate has prepared me perfectly for this role.
- Bowling: For Candidate Ball, You referred to some projects you worked on with some organizations, can you elaborate and specify what you did for these projects?
 - Ball: Just now starting to work with Dance Marathon, but buddy system in high school was an opportunity to talk with those who were struggling and take their ideas into Student Government. Implemented accessibility at Homecoming and Field Day, even if they could not fully participate, created an alternative space to allow for a degree of involvement. Something is better than nothing. Even a little bit of inclusion can really help boost morale and self-esteem, even if it is not quite equality.
- Hunter, with reservation for a follow-up: For Candidate Ball, how do you plan to draw the line between advocacy and coddling of students using these services, understanding that a critique of advocacy for those with differences and disabilities is that they get coddled and they are not appreciative of that?
 - Ball: Fine line between advocacy and coddling. Advocacy stands by their side, coddling is when you do it for them. They should be there with you helping to advocate for what they want.
- Edouard: For Candidate Ball, you mentioned that even if it is not equality it is inclusion, can you elaborate on that?
 - Ball: Can you provide more context so I can provide a better answer?
 - Edouard: It's okay, thank you
- Randall: For Candidate Remington, do you have any experience in media relations, such as communication with news outlets?
 - Remington: Primarily through social media.
- Randall, with reservation for a follow-up: For Candidate Rowan, Can you tell me about a problem you have solved in a unique or unusual way, and what was the outcome?
 - Rowan: Solving problems in a unique and unusual way has been necessary as Parliamentarian. Our governing documents are vague; there is little to work off. Anyone

you ask may give a different answer for what those words mean. Must work through all possible solutions and choose the best one because the answers affect students and funding. That attention to detail will help me in PAC.

- Randall: For Candidate Rowan, Can you provide an example of a policy you conformed to that you were not happy with, and why?
 - Rowan: The advice I gave this evening on the Statutes regarding major offices. Must recognize that my idea of the way that offices should be seen and held differ from how it is written in Statutes. While that may be a springboard for later action, must go off the plain-text reading at the time.
- Hunter: For Candidate Remington, how to plan to help Senate's image on campus, through both social media and public relations?
 - Remington: You are in Senate no matter where you are. Always put your best foot forward.
- Bowling: For Candidate Ball, are there any policies you would like to see implemented in your organization?
 - Ball: Spending time with those affected and taking on the full measures of the problems they face. Analyze, listen, speak out. Programming, buddy contacts, hear their stories and be an effective voice. They are used to trying to advocate for themselves, so it is vital to stand with them and help them get what they need. Hard to advocate for something you have never experienced.
- **Hunter moves to forward the candidates individually, Powell seconds; no objections**
- Closing Statements:
 - Ball: This advocacy will set me on a good path. Help with the problems they face because we cannot advocate for something we have never experienced without listening to what they want done.
 - Rowan: You all have heard my voice enough tonight, and you will probably hear more from me as the night continues.
 - Remington: This will be a lasting experience beyond my time at FSU.

Allocating funding from the Programming Allocations Committee to fund Classical Guitar Society at FSU, Biomedical Engineering Society, and Special Olympics FSU.

- Randall: **POI**, is this Consent Resolution over \$2,000?
 - Harmon: Yes, in total, but we do not need a 2/3 vote. That requirement is for individual line items over \$2,000.

Powell moves to approve Consent Resolution 21, Bowling seconds; no objections

Resolution 22 Sponsored by Senator Nasworthy (P)
Allocating funding from the Resources & Travel Allocations Committee to fund the Every Nation Campus and Society of Women Engineers FAMU-FSU.

- Opening Statement:
 - Nasworthy: Representing Every Nation Campus, they requested money for a Southeastern regional retreat in North Gainesville. \$2,150 for 24 students,

whether members of the organization or not. During RTAC, debate on whether this violates Statute 802.5(e), which states that no event can be funded if it is proselytizing. Decided that conversion is a possibility at this event but it is not the main purpose of the event.

- Technical Non-Debatable Questions:
 - Randall: How will this event be advertised?
 - Nasworthy: By the RSO, Every Nation Campus, for 24 students who apply. Through social media.
- Pro:
 - Hunter: **POI**, Can you repeat which Statute which was referred to?
 - Nasworthy: 802.5(e)
 - Rowan: Statute reads: "Religious based student groups may receive funding for awareness/advertising of their RSO on campus, RSO events, and travel that advances their mission at Florida State University. Funding for proselytizing is prohibited. Religious based organizations providing service are exempt from being registered as a service organization. Religious groups can request money for service projects or service travel, but must not proselytize their religion. Religious topics or lectures may be offered during travel or events; however, if requested by a participant, an alternate activity must be arranged. "
 - Bowling: Had questions about this when it can through Finance, but they explained the retreat format and if someone is not particularly religious they are still welcome to attend and have fun with pressure to convert.
 - Lessard: **POI**, Do we know if attendance is mandatory?
 - Nasworthy: That did not come up in RTAC.
 - Lessard: **POI**, Does the organization have a representative present?
 - Williams: yes
 - **Lessard moves for a non-Senator to speak, Marcus seconds, no objections**
 - Williams: Krystal Williams, President of Every Nation Campus. Nobody is forced to attend anything, there will be 2 sessions and neither are mandatory. Discussion is advertised beforehand.
 - Powell: **POI**, students must apply to attend?
 - Randall: **POC**, all events funded by PAC or RTAC are open to all students even if there is an application.
 - DuChene: Let these students go to their retreat.
 - Roy: As PAC Chair, always ask myself if it helps students get the experience they are looking for on campus. Whether or not you agree with the ideology or organization's mission, students are looking for this opportunity.

 - Randall: Allocates \$750 to the Jewish Student Union for the Director's fall semester salary, bringing it in line with every other agency. \$10 per hour for 7.5 hours per week. Pay will start October 3rd. This has been run by the Business Manager and other SGA staff, as well as Student Body Treasurer Gray. Has the full support of the Jewish Student Union.

 - Little: JSU should be recognized as equal with all other agencies.
 - Roy: Fully support this; we see the JSU Director quite a bit and know he works hard. He deserves to be paid the same as others.
 - Tackett: Great bill from a great Senator. Commend the Senator for ensuring the minimum wage is correct.
 - Marcus: This bill places JSU at the same level as the other agencies and is a great use of Executive Projects money.
 - Con:
 - No speakers
 - **Bowling moves to pass by acclimation, Tsouroukdissian seconds**
 - **Roy objects; Bowling withdraws**
 - **Marcus moves to call the question, Nasworthy seconds; no objections**
 - Closing Statement:

- Randall: This bill is only for fall funding. JSU requested from Sweepings to fund JSU wages for the spring, per a request from Treasurer Gray. This will only pass if the associated resolution passes as well.
- Vote: 34-0-0
- **RESULT: BILL 52 PASSES**

Sponsored by Senator J. Hitchcock, T. Murray (P) Guillamont, K. Hitchcock, Nemeth, Powell, Puwalski, Remler, Russell, Tsouroukdissian, West (Co)

To amend Student Body Statutes to remove the requirement for a Student Senator to have served two years or more in the Student Senate in order to be awarded membership in the Student Senate Hall of Fame. **REFERRED TO JUDICIARY, 09.15. AMENDED AND PASSED IN JUDICIARY, 09.21.**

- Opening Statement:
 - T. Murray: This is to ensure that those who we believe are eligible for the Senate Hall of Fame can be in the Hall of Fame. Description on the calendar is no longer accurate; requirement is now 1 full calendar year or 1 full term. If someone serves a full term that is less than a calendar year, they still qualify. We can all agree there are Senators in the Senate who are super deserving of a Hall of Fame nomination, but they have not served for 2 years. The requirement as it stands would bar some of our best Senators. I understand the prestige that some feel the 2-year requirement offers, but the prestige is maintained by only 4 Senators being allowed to be inducted per year. We would rather be remembered by the work we do in Senate than the number of meetings we went to.
- Technical Non-Debatable Questions:
 - Roy: Does this 1-year served include time served in a Senate leadership officer position?
 - T. Murray: No, only for Senators.
- Pro:
 - Tackett: **POI**, former Senator Jake Alvarez is in the Senate Hall of Fame; did that count time served as Parliamentarian?
 - Rowan: Believe 2 full terms as a Senator
 - Harmon: Inducted at the end of term, then became Parliamentarian
 - Marcus: **POI** for sponsor, what do you believe the standard is for an exceptional Senator for the Hall of Fame?
 - T. Murray: This was J. Hitchcock's idea in response to Senators' hard work in the Rules of Procedure Ad Hoc.
 - Hunter: **POI**, when amendments are made, additions are underlined and committee changes are bolded. Is the bolded section an addition even though it was not underlined?
 - Harmon: Yes it was added in committee, should be underlined
 - Hunter: are the underlined parts just parts that were changed?
 - Harmon: I believe they readded the parts that were struck.
 - Wang: **POC**, this strikes "2 years" and replaces it with "1 calendar year or 1 full term"
 - Bowling: I support; results of elections should not determine Senate Hall of Fame eligibility, some good work goes unnoticed
 - Gonzalez: **POI** for the sponsor, is there a reason why a subsection was not added to say we can overrule the threshold with a vote and keep the threshold as 2 years? Why was the automatic answer to reduce the time requirement?
 - T.Murray: The original intention was to remove entirely, and requiring a vote was not considered. Added back some time requirement in Judiciary committee.

- Gonzalez: would you find it friendly to keep 2 years requirement but add the option to overrule with a vote?
 - T. Murray: Not ready to answer that; if the motion is made and there are no objections, would consider
- Hunter: **POI** for the sponsor, how does this take into account summer leaves of absence? If a Senator takes leave during the summer per Statutes, is it still considered a full term?
 - T. Murray: That is the reason for including a calendar year or a full term. For example, someone appointed and confirmed to a Spring seat during the summer who is then reelected the following spring semester has not served a full term, but has served one full calendar year.
- Hunter: **POI** for Pro-Tempore, what is the definition of a full term?
 - Wang: Good question.
 - Harmon: Technically, someone on a leave of absence is still a Senator. One term is from the time you start in Senate until the end of that term, whether it ends in fall or spring. Would be less than a year if appointed.
- Hunter: **POI**, for senators appointed in the summer for a fall seat, their term is from their term until their seat is up for reelection. Is that a full term?
 - T. Murray: Do not agree with that assessment.
 - Harmon: Up to you all to decide how you interpret.
- Marcus: **POC**, the stipulation regarding one calendar year should make up for that because it can be calculated either way.
- Wang: **POC**, I was appointed March 2020, so one calendar year would be March 2021. But would not be a full term from March 2020 to Fall when I was reelected.
- **Marcus moves to amend to add:**
 - c. Only senators who have served two calendar years or two full terms or more in the Student Senate may be considered.**
 - i. the length of the Senator's term beyond this threshold shall not count for or against the nominee**
 - ii. time served shall count time served in Senate Officer positions such as Senate Clerk, Senate Press secretary, and senate parliamentarian**
 - iii. This stipulation may be overruled by a 3/4 vote of the senate in situations where the senate determines a nominee's work is exceptional (emphasis added) in a shorter amount of time.**
 - **Roy seconds**
 - **Hunter objects; Marcus does not withdraw**
 - Opening Statement:
 - Marcus: The Hall of Fame is meant for most exceptional Senators. Reducing the limit to one term or year reduces eligibility down to the expectation that we serve the entirety of the term. Worry that reduction to 1 year required reduces the impact of the honor. This keeps the 2 years or 2 terms requirement while removing the procedural nightmare. The vote of 3/4 allows us to override. Accounts for transfer or graduate students who may not be able to overcome this threshold. Would be willing to bring 3/4 vote down to 2/3.
 - Technical Non-Debatable Questions:
 - N/A
 - Pro:
 - Tackett: Our forefathers in the 54th Senate came up with the Senate Hall of Fame in 2002 with a 2-year rule. Over 19 Senates since then, only 33 Senators have been put in the Hall

of Fame. Should keep exclusivity at 2 years. 3/4 vote can overrule. This accounts for officer positions.

- **Gonzalez moves to amend strike “for 2 full terms” from section B; Stults seconds**
 - **Hunter objects**
 - Opening Statement:
 - Gonzalez: We should just revert everything to how it was before we had this debate and avoid the confusion. If someone is appointed in the summer, their seat is up for reelection in the fall and they lose. If then appointed to a spring seat and serve until the end of spring, that is still 1 year. The full-term part makes it confusing. It should stay at 2 years because it is so special. In any sport, cannot make it into the Hall of Fame after only 1 year.
 - Technical Non-Debatable Questions:
 - N/A
 - Pro:
 - Powell: **POI**, what is the nomination process for Hall of Fame?
 - Harmon: Write a resolution, usually including what the Senator has done, positions held, how long they served, etc. Resolution comes to the floor and the vote gets them added to the Hall of Fame if passed and signed. Names will be engraved in the new chamber.
 - Linsky: Flattered that you think the Rules of Procedure Ad Hoc has done a great job. In support of this being 2 years. The Hall of Fame is cool but it is not why I do the work, nor why most of us do the work. Worry about lowering the incentive.
 - Roy: This is easier to calculate and the simplest.
 - Marcus: This reduces confusion. Adding up months is easier than adding parts of terms. Terms are subjective based on when elections happen.
 - Con:
 - Little: Elections do not happen at a consistent time. Spring 2021 electees were not sworn in until April, and if the next spring election is confirmed sooner than April, Senators will have not served a full calendar year although they served a full term. Unfair to discount people due to the way the dates fall. Will vote no.
 - Barrett: Situations could arise in which a Junior transfers in with experience but would not be eligible because they graduate just shy of the end of their second term. This should be based on merit. Do not see the reason for the requirement at all.
 - Tackett: While the math of 2 full terms is difficult, that is important in nominating a Senator. Time and thought should go into it; can do math if we need to.
 - **DuChene moves to call the question, Tsouroukdissian seconds; no objections**

- Closing Statement:
 - Gonzalez: Hearing you all out, but I am not arguing that the math is hard. What if it has been less than a year but 2 full terms? The option to override is there, so if they are truly so exceptional, should be no issue to override.
- Vote: 7-22-6
- **RESULT: AMENDMENT IS NOT ADOPTED**
 - Roy: Could not speak more highly. This is a huge honor and the stipulation ensures that it is only awarded to the most deserving. Should not give those who only served one year an easy pass. Supports adding time served as an officer; they are here every night doing just as much work, sometimes more.
 - Wood: Requires reelection and therefore the support of constituents, so a higher standard that not just anyone can achieve.
- Con:
 - Hunter: This is a haphazard amendment. The first subpoint (i) does not count for officer terms beyond this threshold. There is no precedent for 3/4 vote, only 2/3. Should include a definition of what a “term” is to alleviate disparities.
 - Harmon: **POC**, there is precedent for 3/4 vote but it was removed. PAC and RTAC Chairs used to require a 3/4 vote to remove.
 - Marcus: **POC**, I consulted with the Parliamentarian when writing this regarding 3/4 vote. Point (i) is language that I copied from another piece of legislation. Friendly to changing 3/4 to 2/3
 - Roy: **POC**, Point (i) says that if you are beyond 2 years, that does not count for or against you.
 - Gonzalez: **POI**, does one need to be a Senator at the time to be nominated?
 - Harmon: It is not specified but that is my assumption.
 - T. Murray: We still have the power to accept or deny people into the Hall of Fame with a 2/3 vote without this amendment. If you do not want them to be in the Hall of Fame because they have only served a year, do not vote for them. This does not guarantee acceptance, it only makes more people eligible and makes deserving people eligible.
 - Powell: Wording is unnecessary and confusing.
- Pro:
 - Gonzalez: Serving 2 years means that a Senator has served in 2 completely different Senates. From the beginning of the Senator’s term until the end of 2 years, a Senator would be serving alongside different people because people do not typically stay in Senate for longer than a year. A completely different body is determining if your service during their time qualifies for the Hall of Fame. You must prove yourself to at least 4 inaugurations; that establishes the threshold and should not be lowered. The names in the Hall of Fame mean something to the campus. Semantics are straightforward.
 - Tsouroukdissian: **POI** for the sponsor, would you be friendly to an amendment to the amendment to clarify whichever comes first, 2 calendar years or 2 full terms?

- Marcus: Yes.
 - **Hunter moves to amend to change 3/4 vote to 2/3 vote, Randall seconds; no objections**
 - **Sponsor finds the amendment friendly; amendment adopted.**
 - Roy: Amendment is well-worded and needs to be organized this way. People will vote in support of adding nominees to the Hall of Fame if you put it in front of them; people seldom vote no for their fellow Senators.
 - Con:
 - Hunter: **POI** for the sponsor, in regards to part (ii), if they served a year and a half as Parliamentarian and then for half a year as a Senator, they can be in the Senate Hall of Fame?
 - Marcus: Yes, Senator Roy's idea.
 - Barrett: Should be based more on merit than time served; someone can sit in Senate for 2 years and do nothing but still get into the Hall of Fame based on a vote.
 - Hunter: Do not think we should pass this amendment as it would be the first time that "full term" has been used in Statutes. Removing that would not be the answer to the problem, but full term does not have any definition. Should at least consider defining it.
 - Randall: **POI**, can we send legislation on the floor back to committee?
 - Harmon: Yes, can move to remand it back to committee, but we are on the amendment right now.
 - **Gonzalez moves to call the question, T. Murray seconds; no objections**
 - Closing Statement:
 - Marcus: The verbiage of "term" was copied from the original bill, struck out just above. This confusion is not from me as the amender; do not appreciate the sentiments regarding that. Trying to compromise because I do not think this will pass without compromise. We are very divided on this even though I think we all want the same people in the Hall of Fame. It is very clear who should be in the Hall of Fame and who should not, but we disagree on semantics. I am trying but everything has gone awry. If this amendment does not pass, this needs to be put back in committee.
 - Vote: 19-7-7
 - **RESULT: AMENDMENT IS ADOPTED**
- Pro:
 - Little: Senate Hall of Fame is highest honor to award Senators. We also have yearly Senate awards that we vote on and Senator of the Month. Lots of ways to reward Senators who do good work in a short amount of time, but Hall of Fame is reserved for those whose legacy will be remembered for years and decades. Keep in mind what a great honor it is, it means something to be reelected by constituents.
 - **Hunter moves to amend to strike "2 full terms" and replace with "2 terms of office", Tsouroukdissian seconds; no objections**
 - **Sponsor finds it friendly; amendment is adopted**
 - Wang: Good idea to add back in 2 years. Initially taken aback by the removal entirely because this is the highest honor for Senators. We are allowed to

induct no more than 4 Senators; this is very prestigious. We do not have to award 4 people every year, should only award the most deserving.
