Whereas: The Faculty Senate at Florida State University on February 24th, 2021 passed a Resolution on the Presidential Search Process urging the selection process to conclude before the end of the Spring 2021 semester, and

Whereas: In the resolution, the Faculty Senate stated this is strongly encouraged in order to ensure that the overall process maximizes opportunities for faculty and student input, and

Whereas: According to Florida State University's Facebook produced by the Office of Institutional Research, student credit hours in the Fall 2019 semester totaled 516,379; in the Spring 2020 semester credit hours totaled 495,385; and in the Summer 2019 semester credit hours totaled 170,759, and

Whereas: Due to these facts, it can be concluded that the number of students not taking classes in the summer semester is only 34% compared to the spring semester, and the student body is not active on campus during the summer semester, and

Whereas: In the Position Profile created by the Presidential Search committee it is stated that "FSU recently became the largest university in the country to have an experiential learning graduation requirement for its undergraduates. Before graduating, students will engage in at least one transformational, career-building internship, undergraduate research experience, international study, service-learning, or other engaged learning program", and

Whereas: The student body at Florida State University often completes this experience during the summer, as seen through internships, FSU's premier study abroad program, and fellowships that occur over the summer, and

Whereas: In the Position Profile & Qualifications created by the Presidential Search committee, it is stated that the most qualified candidate will have a "demonstrated commitment to all aspects of student success. In addition, the successful candidate will embrace FSU's long-standing commitment to a student-centric approach to education", and

Whereas: In order to achieve this qualification, the search committee should be cognizant of allowing students to maximize their involvement in the Presidential Search process, by demonstrating the same qualifications we bestow on Presidential Candidates of being committed to a student-centric approach to this process, therefore

Be it resolved by the Seventy-third Student Senate at Florida State University that: This Senate calls for more action to be taken to involve students in the presidential search process and to maximize their input.

Be it further resolved that: This Senate calls for the search committee to finalize their search before the end of the spring semester. The University Board of Trustees should then hold a special meeting in May, and ensure the new President is able to be in their role by the July Board of Trustees meeting.

Purpose & Description: The Center for Health Advocacy & Wellness (CHAW) encourages students to make healthy lifestyle decisions that facilitate academic success and lead to life-long health and wellness. To achieve its mission, CHAW provides quality, research-based wellness services and health promotion programs that are open to all FSU students. One of these programs is a series of in-person cooking classes held in partnership with Seminole Dining and the Food for Thought Pantry.

CHAW's cooking classes aim to teach students how to prepare simple, budget-friendly, and nutritious recipes in any kitchen. Before the COVID-19 pandemic, classes were capped at twelve students and held in the cooking lab located in the Willams Johnston Building three times per semester in the fall and spring. Classes use food donated by Seminole Dining and are facilitated by a CHAW staff member and involved student.

The purpose of this bill is to restart the cooking classes initiative after a year of inactivity and provide participants with the supplies to cook meals at home. This reduces a small financial barrier for students that are often already living on tight budgets. The quantity was determined by taking the max number of students in a pre-pandemic class and multiplying it by the number of classes that occur in an academic year.

Purpose & Description: Early and affordable access to medical-grade pregnancy tests is essential to helping pregnant students receive information that allows them to make the best decision for their health. In cases where a student chooses to have a baby, taking a test early in their pregnancy allows students to receive important prenatal care as early as possible.

While the cost of a pregnancy test may seem nominal, this bill provides a judgement-free solution that improves students' health. If passed, this legislation would establish a fund for all students, (regardless of their gender identity), to request a urine pregnancy test administered by UHS free of charge. Compared to simply purchasing a pregnancy test in a drugstore, this test includes counseling from a licensed medical provider who can address students' concerns and connect them to prenatal care if they choose to continue the pregnancy.

Purpose & Description: According to data from the National College Health Assessment survey, FSU students report that sleep was one of the top 10 impediments to academic success. Knowing that getting enough sleep is vital to academic success, the Center for Health Advocacy & Wellness (CHAW) launched a campaign in Spring 2020 to provide students with valuable information about optimal sleeping habits and the effects of sleep on their health, wellbeing, and safety.

To facilitate these conversations, CHAW created a “sleep kit” consisting of essential oil, a sleep mask, a bag of sleepy time tea, and a card with 5 tips for healthy sleep habits. CHAW distributed 300 kits in Spring 2020 and 100 kits in March 2021 as part of this healthy sleeping habits campaign.

This bill requests 500 sleep kits that will be distributed in Summer C 2021 to students living in on-campus housing. To reduce costs, this bill includes 72 bags that will be used for an item in another bill that provides cooking supplies for students.
